In Colonial Williamsburg they specialize in colonial era foods and original recipes. Trust me, they go deeper than that; they grow the original herbs and spices called for in the recipe books. Try a crock of cheese (made the way it was in the 1700s) or a beef pasty. And if you want authentic, read this:

➤ Gather 'round at Chowning's Tavern for hearty, Colonial-inspired pub fare, all served up in an authentic alehouse atmosphere. Try favorites of our founding fathers, including savory Shepherd's Pye and satisfying trenchers served in bread bowls. Want to take a piece of Colonial Williamsburg home with you? Order a local craft beer and keep the traditional salted mug.

The Thanksgiving buffet/spread in the taverns and restaurants are called "Groaning Boards". As can easily be seen, the sideboards on which the array of food is displayed groans with the weight of deliciousness! Seriously, the aromas of food will leave your mouth watering from when you step in the door....



Then, there is the décor. Did you know that a pineapple was the traditional 'sign of welcome' in our nation's founding days? Not only was it used live (and a rarity of course; think of getting a fresh pineapple to our east coast in the 1700s!) but sometimes it was 'carved' into the wooden welcome at a doorpost. In Williamsburg, at Christmas, the decorations are always live. Pineapples decay slowly so, once during the season, they are traded out for fresh ones. Hundreds of them around this stellar, historic property!

If you've never eaten at Colonial Williamsburg I exhort you to try to get there for it live, or make something from a recipe (you can find easily online/ <a href="https://wydaily.com/local-news-old/2014/11/27/thanksgiving-holiday-recipes-echo-colonial-traditions/">https://wydaily.com/local-news-old/2014/11/27/thanksgiving-holiday-recipes-echo-colonial-traditions/</a>)

At Thanksgiving the colonials sat down to dinner with weighty abundance of fruits and vegetables, fowl and boar, venison and fresh pies stacked sometimes over a foot high. With tallow candles and sterling silver (hand beaten) utensils (which you can purchase today; I priced a serving spoon about 16 inches long maybe 20 years ago and learned it was \$4800 then!)

How about you, beloved? What will you do for thanksgiving?

Whatever it is I hope you know you are loved. You are precious to this Heritage family, and you are welcome at our table always! *And may your banquet be abundant and your life full.*
