Introducing Rev. Jeff Hopson:

August 2018

Jeff Hopson was born on November 23, 1951 and raised in Northeastern New Mexico on a ranch. His parents (Harry and Lindit') taught him and his siblings (the four J's altogether) to believe they were just as close to God on a horse, riding through a pasture, as sitting in a Cathedral. He still believes that.

Jeff was the only student in Second Grade; there was no telephone or television at Triangle Ranch then. It didn't really matter though because there were great friends in the headquarters' library books. As he moved through school each town and class was larger. Graduating from Oklahoma State University (Poli. Sci.) in 1977, Jeff returned to Albuquerque where he entered Politics. Although he'd not been raised in the church (it was 2 ½ hours to the closest congregation from the ranch) he eventually became more and more active in the three First Presbyterian Churches to which he belonged over the years.

Finally, in April of 1983 God got Jeff's attention and said, "No, not sometime. Now!" The sense of call was overwhelming and he graduated from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary in 1987. Jeff served five Presbyterian churches in Pennsylvania before being pastor at First Congregational Church, Stockton, CA (UCC), and he is now delighted to be back home at Heritage in the PC/USA!

Jeff will be providing his monthly Sermon plans so everyone knows what to look forward to. The following are the Sermon Gist for August.

THE WELL PROJECT:

“I was thirsty – And you gave me water.” In South Sudan and Niger, millions of women and children trek up to eight hours a day to collect water from marshes, ditches or hand-dug trenches where water is often contaminated. The people often have no choice what to drink. However tainted, water is crucial for survival. Instead of going in, building the well and then leaving, the Presbyterian Church (USA) makes a long-term commitment to change the local culture in its understanding of water and sanitation.

- Local people are taught how to build and repair the wells.
- Local people are taught to maintain the wells so the source does not become polluted.
- Water conservation practices are introduced.
- Irrigation is introduced to grow more food.

Please take minute the next time you turn on a faucet to get a drink of clean water and think about those around the world who do not have that option. **We challenge you to give a penny, nickel, dime or quarter each time you take a drink during the month of August!**

ALL ABOUT THE DUCs

Disciples Under Construction (DUCs) is the Youth Group focused on faith, fellowship and fun. Comprised of 6th – 12th graders, it is led by Andy Singaas and Patty Wahlgren. This group meets for Sunday School in their classroom at the end of the upstairs

hallway, where no two lessons are the same. Lessons range from art projects on the Presbyterian symbol, watching and discussing Christian themed movies, Bible trivia games, mission projects, or even making sand mandalas and discussing how other religions are similar to ours. In short, the youth show up on Sunday mornings not knowing what to expect! (To be fair, when working the youth the leaders often do not know what to expect either!!)

For additional fellowship, the group meets at least once a month for fun activities. These include, but are not limited to, scavenger hunts at the church, bowling, the CROP walk, and a WIDE variety of games where virtually every inch of the church building is used. (If you ever need to know where something in the church is---just ask a DUC!) A favorite event for the year is the annual Lock-In at church where the DUCs use their knowledge of the church to navigate the building playing games in the dark. The other big event is the offsite retreat which has been held for the last two years at Camp Ashland and was previously held at Camp Calvin Crest. Themes for this event include God's Army, Star Wars: May the Faith Be With You, and The LEGO Retreat: Think, Create, Grow.

Outside of these 'DUC' events, the youth are encouraged to be active in the church, participating in worship (candle lighters, ushers, communion helpers, and choirs), helping with church events and serving on committees. Every three years, youth who have completed grades 8-12 are eligible to attend the Presbyterian Youth Triennium at Purdue University in Indiana. In 2016, seven youth attended PYT as part of the Homestead Presbytery delegation. The next PYT will be held next summer, July 16-20, 2019.
